The Eighties

The Reagan Years of the 1980s took the nation from the greatest creditor nation to the greatest debtor nation and spurred one of the largest growths of the Northeastern Province of any decade. During the 1980s, seventeen active chapters and eight alumni chapters were chartered in the Northeastern Province. The sixty chapters placed a Kappa Chapter on most of the major colleges campuses and in most of the major cities in the Northeastern Province. The new active chapters were Kappa Gamma of West Chester State University (April 14, 1980), Kappa Mu of SUNY at New Paltz (October 18, 1980), Kappa Rho of SUNY at Albany (April 11, 1981), Kappa Omega of Shippensburg University (November 6, 1981), Lambda Alpha of Bloomsburg University (November 7, 1981), Lambda Xi of Brown University (March 12, 1983), Lambda Tau of Millersville University (September 17, 1983), Mu Beta of East Stroudsburg University (November 17, 1984), Mu Kappa of SUNY at Binghamton (October 26, 1985), Mu Omicron of Suny at Old Westbury (February 22, 1986), Mu Pi of St. John's University (March 16, 1986), Mu Chi of Dartmouth College (February 14, 1987), Nu Gamma of Yale University (March 26, 1987), Nu Xi of University of Delaware (January 14, 1989), Nu Pi of Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (February 11, 1989), Nu Tau of University of Massachusetts (March 10, 1989), and Nu Phi of Lock Haven University (November 18, 1989). The seven alumni chapters were Willingboro-Fort Dix-McGuire Air Force Base Alumni (July 10, 1981), Montclair Alumni (May 22, 1982), Norristown Alumni (January 25, 1986), Englewood-Teaneck of NJ (March 7, 1987), Plainfield Alumni (March 19, 1988), Chester Alumni (June 25, 1988), Providence Alumni (December 9, 1988) and Springfield Alumni (June 23, 1989). The large number of chapters in the Northeastern Province required reorganization of the Province. This will be discussed later in this chapter.

Northeastern Province Councils in the Eighties

In 1980, along with the policy of the Northeastern Province granting host chapters up to two years to plan for the Province Council Meeting, Northeastern Province Polemarch James M. Kidd standardized the format of the Province Council Meeting, making the planning and the hosting of the meeting smooth and efficient.

The expansion of the Northeastern Province in the eighties increased the attendance at the Province Council Meeting, resulting in the meeting being quite profitable. The Northeastern Province generously shared these profits with the host chapters, creating competition among alumni chapters throughout the Province competing for the opportunity to host a province council meeting.

On April 11-13, 1986, the Newark Alumni Chapter hosted a highly successful Province Council Meeting at the Meadowland Hilton Hotel in Secaucus, New Jersey. The attendance at this Council Meeting well reflected the expansion of the Province.

Northeastern Province Polemarchs in the Eighties

During the 1980s, the Grand Polemarchs began to seek the recommendation of the Provinces in the appointment of Province Polemarchs. Northeastern Province Polemarch James M. Kidd (1979-1981) passed away while in office in 1981 and Senior Vice-Polemarch Melvin Taylor (1981-1982) of New York Alumni was appointed to complete his term. Three Northeastern Province Polemarchs who served during this decade followed him. They were Richard A. Scott of Harrisburg Alumni (1982-1986), Harold B. Adams of Philadelphia Alumni (1986-1988) and Samuel C. Hamilton of Hartford Alumni (1988-1991).

C. Rodger Wilson Leadership Conferences

In 1979, at the 62nd Grand Chapter Meeting, the Undergraduate Leadership Conference and all other regional Leadership Conferences were renamed the C. Rodger Wilson Leadership Conference in honor of the deceased Past grand Polemarch.

The Burlington-Camden Alumni Chapter hosted the first Northeastern Province C. Rodger Wilson Leadership Conference at the Travel Lodge Tower in Mount Laurel, New Jersey on October 11, 1980. The conference used the same format and procedures that had been used by the Northeastern Province Leadership Conferences in prior years. In the years that followed, active and alumni chapters hosted C. Rodger Wilson Leadership Conferences at various hotels and on college or university campuses throughout the Province.

At the C. Rodger Leadership Conference hosted by Harrisburg Alumni on October 4-5, 1985 at the Holiday Inn Center City in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, registration fees were set as follows: \$20 for each alumni chapter and \$10 for each active chapter member. Chapter officers required to attend were: the Polemarch, Keeper of Records, Keeper of Exchequer, Pledge Dean, Guide Right Director, and the Active Chapter Advisor.

Northeastern Province Life Membership

The Northeastern Province Life Membership Program was established to eliminate Province dues for life and to assist the Province with its operating expenses. The first life memberships were issued in 1984 at a cost of \$200 per member. A maximum of members was established at 100. If any life member transferred to another Province, the Northeastern Province would pay up to \$10 per year toward his Province dues for life. The \$200 fee was deposited in an escrow account, not to be used except for emergencies. Any funds withdrawn would be considered a loan and would be repaid by the Province. The interest received from the account would be available to assist the Province with its operation. In 1984, Northeastern Polemarch Richard A. Scott appointed Brother R. Duke Marshall III of New York Alumni the first Chairman of the Northeastern Province Membership Program. Brother Marshall served in that position from 1984 until 1994. The life membership continued to grow and at the end of 1989 there were 89 Northeastern Province Life Members

He pledged at Cheyney (Gamma Omega) and Lincoln University (Epsilon) in 1976.

He is involved in elections for the Student Government Association and is seeking election to the office of social treasurer for the SGA

Robert F. Jones, Jr. established a Big Brother Program to help supplement the need of a young boy for a father or older male figure. This program allows the members to get in touch with the needs of the community and service them in one of many ways.

History of Willingboro-Fort Dix-McGuire Air Force Base Alumni

The Willingboro-Fort Dix-McGuire Air Force Base Alumni Chapter was authorized by the Grand Chapter officers at a board meeting on March 7, 1981 in Detroit, Michigan. This authorization was based on a petition of twenty-two Kappa men in the Willingboro-Fort Dix-McGuire area who saw a need for an alumni chapter. These men were Claude R. Attaway, Gorham L. Black III, Dr. William F. Duck, John Grinnage, George E. Henderson, Jr., Oliver Houston, Philip W. Houston, Edward S. James, Robert Johnson, Justin F. McNeil, Dr. Ezra A. Merritt, Roy Paige, Cleophus, A. Robinson II, Cleophus A. Robinson III, Michael Robinson, Herman Robinson, Fred Rucker, Dr. George L. Sampson, Arthur L. Smith, Albert F. Washington, Henry A. Wiggins, Charles F. Williams, and James E. Williams, Sr.

The chartering of the chapter was held at the Fort Dix Officers Club on July 10, 1981. The statement on the program for the occasion of the chartering declared that "the chapter would be committed to the high ideals and purpose of the Fraternity. We dedicate ourselves to achievement and pledge to continue the stewardship entrusted in us and to foster the dream of our Founding Fathers in 1911 at Bloomington, Indiana."

The first officers of the chapter were Albert F. Washington, Polemarch; Dr. Ezra A. Merritt, Vice Polemarch; Charles F. Williams, Keeper of Records; John Grinnage, Assistant Keeper of Records, Cleophus A. Robinson III, Keeper of Exchequer; James E. Williams, Sr., Assistant Keeper of Exchequer; Herman Robinson, Strategus; Claude R. Attaway, Lieutenant Strategus; and Dr. William F. Duck, Historian. The members of the Board of Directors were George E. Henderson, Jr., Oliver Houston, Robert Johnson, Justin F. McNeil, and Cleophus A. Robinson II.

Dr. William Duck was the Master of Ceremonies for the occasion, the theme of which was "We Train for Leadership". Other participants were the Chapter Polemarch, Albert F. Washington, who extended the greetings; James E. Williams, Sr., who gave the invocation; musical selections by Ms. Jacqueline McNeil, and the keynote speaker, Earl A. Morris, Executive Secretary of **Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Incorporated** who was introduced by Justin F. McNeil. A highlight of the event was a tribute to charter members that was given by James M. Kidd, Polemarch of the Northeastern Province. Dr. Ezra A. Merritt made a special presentation, which was followed by the *Kappa Alpha Psi Hymn* led by Philip Houston and the benediction by Charles F. Williams. Assorted hot hors d'oeuvres, coffee tea and milk were served to the accompaniment of music for listening and dancing pleasure.

History of Lambda Alpha

Fall 1976, under the leadership of Dr. Jesse A. Bryan (Alpha Epsilon), 12 young men joined to form an interest group that would seek to become members of the noble clan of **Kappa Alpha Psi**. After contacting International Headquarters, Dr. Bryan was notified that the young men would be under the guidance of the Delta Theta Chapter at Penn. State University. The brothers of Delta Theta journeyed to Bloomsburg State College, Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania and initiated the men into the Scrollers Club. Personal and health reasons caused six of the twelve men to discontinue the program. The remaining members — Brian Ford, William Shelton, Aaron Johnson, Wayne Whitaker, Anthony Montouth, and Alejandro Williams known as the "Dooms Day Squad" — pursued their goal. The winter of 1976 was rough with plenty of snow storms and the distance between Bloomsburg and State College, PA, a little over 90 miles, did not allow for much training to occur and thus extended the training period.

In April 1977 Ford, Johnson, Montouth, and Williams were initiated into the Delta Theta Chapter. Shelton followed in October 1977 and Whitaker in the Spring of 1978 (March 19). This was the beginning of the Delta Theta Swing Chapter at Bloomsburg State College. Two more lines were initiated under Delta Theta: Genesis '80: Ronald Brown and Brian Butcher; and Renaissance '81: Francisco Callado, Charles Wilson, Lamont Baines, Richard Traylor, Ricardo Youngblood, Alfred Black, Donald Tomes, Gerald Gay, Mark Mosely, Bryan Key, Byron Barksdale, Lewis Giles, John Dunn, Gregory Wright, and Eric Jenkins. The International Headquarters was petitioned and the Lambda Alpha Chapter was chartered November 7, 1981. The Lambda Alpha Chapter has been instrumental in the development of other chapters in Northeast Pennsylvania.

On October 26, 1985 Mu Kappa Chapter was established at The State University of New York at Binghamton. The chartering line of the chapter was initiated into the bond on May 15, 1982 under the chapter designation of Kappa Rho, S.U.N.Y. Albany.

The charter members were pledged by the Binghamton Alumni Chapter and visiting brothers from Cornell University, Iota Phi Chapter. Four pledge classes were initiated at Binghamton while given interest group status. Our most recent initiates are the first to bear Mu Kappa as their chapter of initiation. As of April 4, 1986 21 brothers have been made at S.U.N.Y. Binghamton.

The chartering ceremony took place on the S.U.N.Y. campus on the day of the chapter's First Annual Fashion and Talent Extravaganza. Brothers Atty. Richard Scott (Northeastern past provincial Polemarch) and Herman Thomas (Northeastern provincial keeper of records) performed the chartering ceremony. History of Norristown Alumni

It is the 1960s or the early 1970s, Brother Arthur Scott of West Conshohocken, Pennsylvania arranged several meetings in his recreation room for the purpose of organizing a suburban alumni chapter of **Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity.** Brother Scott continued these efforts for sometime but for some reason these endeavors failed. Although the struggles failed to achieve a suburban chapter, these were actually the first efforts of attaining an Alumni Chapter in the suburbs. The activities of establishing an Alumni Chapter in the suburbs of Philadelphia lay dormant but not forgotten. Several Brothers who resided in the outlying counties of Philadelphia (Bucks, Chester Delaware and Montgomery) were showing interest in an Alumni Chapter. Occasionally, they would get together and share social and professional activities. More than fifty Brothers had been identified who lived in the Montgomery County, King of Prussia and Valley Forge areas, and it became certain that there were many others who had not kept in touch with the local alumni chapter or were not in touch personally.

Brother W. Ted Smith wrote a letter to known concerned Brothers. He wanted to find out if they would like to keep in touch on a social and professional basis. Brother Smith made arrangements for a dinner meeting which was held on Monday, October 17, 1983 at 6:00 PM. at the Central Montgomery County Area Vocation & Technical School, at Johnson Highway and New Hope Street in Norristown, Pennsylvania. After dinner, the Brothers discussed activities for the future that would include families, sweethearts and friends. All known Brothers in the outlying areas were asked to join. They were asked to confirm the invitation by Friday, September 30, 1983. The letter was signed "*Yours in the Bond, W. Ted Smith*".

In the fall of 1983, several Brothers who lived and/or worked in the suburban communities of Philadelphia met occasionally for that "*Old Kappa Spirit*" and camaraderie. Several of them met for dinner in October 1983; however, Brother Ted Smith moved to Florida, and many contacts were lost. When Brother Smith returned to this area, the subject of getting together resurfaced. There were many Brothers who were not associated with any active chapters. They expressed interest in keeping the Kappa objectives and goals of Achievement and Brotherhood alive. Another planning dinner meeting was held on Thursday, November 7, 1985 at 6:00 P.M. The cost per Brother was six dollars. The location of the meeting was the Central Montgomery County Area Vocation and Technical School, Norristown, PA.

During 1985, Brother W. Ted Smith served as the representative in the organization of the suburban Kappas. Several Brothers of our Noble Clan who lived in the suburban counties of Philadelphia (Montgomery and Chester in particular) met twice at a dinner meeting. They discussed the possibility and feasibility of developing an Alumni Chapter to meet our needs as Fraternity members. There were approximately 35-40 Brothers who had been

associated with an Alumni Chapter in the southeastern region of Pennsylvania. Additionally, there was the possibility of reclaiming others. The potential of new members through pledging was tremendous. These efforts would in no way lessen the active membership of any other Alumni Chapters in the Delaware Valley.

Brother Ted Smith asked Brother Joseph Meade, Polemarch of Philadelphia Alumni, for his support and guidance during the initial development stages of the suburban chapter of Kappa. Brother Meade provided support and assistance in the development of our chapter's bylaws, membership dues structure, management of records and finances, and helped to organize committees which would raise funds for our charter and other required archives. Brother Meade's guidance and endorsement made this long awaited effort a reality. Brother Smith indicated that we would submit the required fees and petition to National Headquarters.

On November 27, 1985, a letter was written by Brother Smith to the Northeastern Province Polemarch, Brother Richard Scott, stating that we have identified the required number of brothers as specified to start an alumni chapter. Also, we know several others who will become active once they have met their Grand Chapter's financial obligations. Therefore, on November 27,1985, the following names were submitted to the Grand Chapter as a requirement to organize a Norristown Chapter: John H. Culbreath, Webb D. Hallman, Stanley L. Johnson, Jr., Robert E. Murray, Ed.D., Eric H. Payne, Clayton L. Reid, Charles L. Sawyer, Arthur L. Scott, W. Ted Smith, Ph.D., Eugene H. Turpin and Sherman E. Williams.

Brother Richard A. Scott, Northeastern Province Polemarch, was extremely excited about this and hoped that our petition could be presented along with others at the Grand Board's meeting which was scheduled for December 13-14. 1985 in Philadelphia, PA.

On December 14, 1985, the Grand Board of Directors held their scheduled meeting in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. They voted unanimously for the expansion of undergraduate and alumni Chapters of which Norristown, Pennsylvania was selected.

Brother Smith addressed the new chapter with these words: "My Brothers of this Noble Clan: It is with the greatest pride and pleasure that I congratulate all of us for being the Founders of the new Norristown Alumni Chapter of **Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity**, **Incorporated.** On Saturday, December 14, 1985, at approximately 12:00 noon, the Grand Board of Directors at their regularly scheduled meeting voted unanimously to allow expansion of Alumni Chapters of which we were among them. As you are aware, this is only the beginning of a long struggle for our chapter's survival and we must make the commitment to move forward."

On December 20, 1986, a letter was written to Brother Ted Smith from Brother A. F. Moultrie, Executive Secretary of **Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity**. This letter was the official notice that the petition requesting the establishment of an alumni chapter named "The Norristown (PA) Alumni Chapter," was approved by the Grand Board of Directors on December 14, 1985.

Norristown Alumni Chapter – 2002

Norristown proceeded with plans for the actual chartering ceremony. First, they had to remit the sum of \$267.00 to cover the materials for the chapter archives which included the official Charter, five copies of the *Ritual, Constitution and Statutes, Scroller Manual, <u>The Story of Kappa Alpha Psi</u>, bookkeeping system, <u>Roberts Rules of Order</u>. The National Pledge Program Manual, portable file case and the officers' insignia. Brother Smith had to consult with the Polemarch, Brother Richard Scott, in order to determine a chartering date. This information had to be forwarded to the National Headquarters at least fifteen (15) working days prior to the chartering so that all materials could be forwarded to the Province Polemarch. All Norristown officers had to be elected prior to the chartering date in order to be installed during the ceremony.*

On Thursday evening, January 9, 1986 the members of the Norristown (PA) Alumni Chapter elected the following brothers to be the first officers of the proposed new chapter: Polemarch, Walter Theodore Smith; Ph.D. Vice Polemarch, Robert E. Murray; Ed.D, Keeper of Records, Sherman E. Williams; Keeper of Exchequer, Eugene H. Turpin, Dean of Pledges, Webb Hallman.. The new **Kappa Alpha Psi** Norristown Alumni Chapter banner was designed and donated by Brother Sherman Williams on Thursday, January 9, 1986. One of the first actions taken was on Friday, January 10, 1986: the pending new chapter authorized the payment of \$267.00 for the purchase of the charter paraphernalia. January 25, 1986 was the official date of chartering and installation for the Norristown (PA) Alumni Chapter of **Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity**. This is the only chapter to be chartered 75 years to the month of this Noble Clan. The chartering and installation ceremonies were held at the first chapter meeting on February 13, 1986. The Northeastern Province Polemarch, Brother Richard Scott, presided over the meeting. The newly developed suburban chapter will involve itself in a Reclamation Program, a Guide Right Program, and a Social Action Program.

History of Mu Chi

The first line at Dartmouth crossed in 1982 and the chapter functioned as a colony of Theta Iota until 1987. It was difficult to obtain a chapter because the Dartmouth College was still feeling the effects of its transition from a male-only to a coeducational institution. In an effort balance the number of fraternities and sororities, the College had instituted a moratorium on new fraternities. Eventually, the Trustees voted to grant the chapter an exception, and the Mu Chi Chapter was chartered in February 1987, making it the 33rd fraternity at Dartmouth.

History of Englewood-Teaneck Alumni

The Englewood-Teaneck Chapter of **Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc**. was chartered on March 22, 1987. The charter members were William E. Baker, Jerome Boyd, Calvin E. Brown, Joseph Dalton, Jr., Booker Daniels, James V. Dixon, Edward M. Henderson, Robert Herring, Joseph Johnson, James A. Jones, Robert L. Jones, Frank C. Mahon, Charles Robinson, Bernard Seabrooks, Walter Smith and Willie L Sutton. James A. Jones was the first Polemarch. Since its inception, service to the community has been the chapter's major objective, with attention to youth foremost. Englewood-Teaneck Alumni has organized a Kappa League which is comprised of teen males from the community. Through role models, leadership training and cultural experiences, the youngsters are encouraged to achieve and to develop and enhance their talents and abilities. The chapter also sponsors and coaches a championship team in the Teaneck Biddy Basketball League.

As a part of the chapter's community service program, Thanksgiving food baskets and Christmas toys are provided for needy families at an area center. In 1996, Englewood-Teaneck Chapter and Holy Name Hospital combined their efforts to offer free prostate cancer screening at four local churches. The tests were given immediately after morning services. Appointments could also be made with the Community Health Service. The program runs for four weeks and is taught by the brothers of the Chapter. In 1997, Englewood-Teaneck established a computer literacy program.

The Chapter has continued to grow and has received numerous Grand Chapter and Northeastern Province Awards. Members have been elected to a Grand Chapter and a number of Northeastern Province Offices.

Englewood-Teaneck Alumni gives three scholarships each year, supports the Piney Wood Country Life School and is a member of the Foundation Club of the Kappa Alpha Psi Foundation

Nu Gamma Yale University New Haven, CT

Many changes have come recently to Connecticut's only chapter. With the initiation of Brothers Lorne Hammond, Richie Scott, Kevin Briggs and Barry Brown in the Spring of '88, Nu Gamma raised its 1989-90 membership to 11 and expanded to Western Connecticut State, the University of New Haven and University of Bridgeport.

"This is the first time that our chapter has had active participation from brothers outside of Yale," said Nu Gamma Polemarch Derrick Williams. "These brothers are helping to spread Kappa throughout Connecticut we've had a lot of interest expressed at their campuses."

Nu Gamma has plans to expand its Leadership Guide Right project-in which the brothers spend time twice weekly with students from Hillhouse High School-to include two local middle schools as well. "We've had a lot of success with our high school program, and now we're trying to reach the kids at an earlier age," said Guide Right director Tyrone Agar, a Yale junior and fall '88 initiate. "A lot of their mind sets and attitudes are already formed by the time they get to high school, so we hope to have a positive influence which can help get them on the right track."

On November 6, Nu Gamma joined with the New York Alumni Chapter to host 40 minority students from New York City's Andrew Jackson and Collegiate high schools. The brothers took the students to visit several classes, on a tour of campus, and to a panel discussion with Yale students sponsored by Yale's Dean's Office. The purpose of the day was to familiarize inner city students with a college atmosphere, and to de-mystify the Ivy League atmosphere. "A lot of these students are qualified, but won't apply to an Ivy League school," said Agar.

On the day of the Harvard-Yale football game in New Haven, Nu Gamma hosted a tailgate for the numerous alumni and visiting brothers on campus, with free music, food and drink. The event turned into an outdoor party that continued until dark. Nu Gamma has plans for a big spring semester, including a Crimson and Cream semiformal, a stepshow, a clothing and scholarship drive, coaching a Police Athletic League basketball team, participation in New Haven's Greek Week with other black Greek-letter organizations, and an installment in the third annual Nu Gamma Speaker Series.


History of Chester Alumni

Plainfield Alumni Chapter Even before chartering,

They have only recently applied for a charter, but already a group of brothers in Plainfield, N.J., have begun to take their mission of community service and Guide Right seriously.

The 17 brothers who hope some day to become the Plainfield Alumni Chapter have made the youth of the community the target for their civic activity. So far, they have enlisted themselves in the area's New Horizon organization, a community -based program which seeks to prepare college-bound students for university life.

"We work one-on-one with high school students and assist them in almost every facet of career development and college preparation," said William H. Phillips, who heads tile group seeking a charter. "We do everything from helping them fill out SAT forms to advising them on the things to look for in a college."

Brother Phillips and the Kappas in Plainfield have already spent several months working with the young people and have developed some close personal relationships with the high school students. "They need the same kind of help that we needed when we were their age," he said.

"We want to provide a positive, accessible image of black men for them," he continued. "There seems to be an abundance of black professional women who work with the program, but there was really a need for black men to participate.

"Their involvement takes them to a local community center regularly to work with the students. "They talk to us about careers and they really want to know about college and how to prepare for it. It helps ease their minds to talk with us," Phillips said.

The efforts of this chapter-to-be are not confined to working With young people. Already the Plainfield brothers have worked out plans to establish a tax-assistance service for senior citizens in the community. "We thought that would be a worthwhile thing to do since many of the brothers in our group are experienced accountants."

Phillips, a 1978 initiate of the Alpha Phi Chapter at Virginia State University, is a product marketing manager for AT&T.


"We plan to accomplish a great deal here," he said. "But all of the work has been done by an outstanding group of nupes."

History of Nu Xi

On January 14, 1989, at 6:41 P.M., a mark was made in the annals of **Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Incorporated.** It was at this precise time that the Nu Xi chapter of **Kappa Alpha Psi** was chartered at the University of Delaware. Since that time, Nu Xi has been committed to achievement in every field of human endeavor. From that shining moment until now, 49 dynamic brothers have entered the bond of fraternity through the chapter. Included in these members are the blood line and charter members: Horace A. Trent, III, James A. Benson, Thomas C. Goudeaux, Charles A. Tucker, Guilliam V. Knight, Troy D. Catlet, Steven Fennal, Antoine J. Allen, Mark W. Stoval, Timothy Jacobs, Jr., Darrin W. Ferrel, and Frederick D. Bryant.

Every member has diligently strove to uphold the ideals of our grand fraternity, and to execute its five objectives: (1) to unite college men of culture, patriotism, and honor in a bond of fraternity; (2) to encourage achievement in every field of human endeavor; (3) to promote the spiritual, social, intellectual, and moral welfare of its members; (4) to assist the aims and purposes of college and universities; and (5) to inspire service in the public interest. Each member has internalized these concepts and used them throughout their lives to uplift Kappa Alpha Psi's motto: "Training for Leadership". Some of the many programs that the Nu Xi Chapter sponsors in recognition of these ideals are the annual Achievement Dinner, the Black Male Leadership Conference, Adopt-a-Classroom, Adopt-a-Highway, and the Kappa Kabaret. The Achievement Dinner is a banquet in honor of an outstanding freshman male who composes an essay on the subject: "What Achievement Means to Me". In addition to receiving a dinner in his honor, the student also receives a cash award. This year, the chapter was honored to have Northeastern Province Polemarch, Brother Tilghman L. Moore, speak at this function. The Black Male Leadership Conference is a weekend of programming for African-American high school students on the University of Delaware's campus. The aim of the BMLC is to ease the transition from high school to college for young adults. To initiate the program, the brothers locate any possible candidates from high schools in the Tri-State area, and create an open dialogue among the students, their parents, and the brothers. If they are interested, arrangements are made for their lodging and meals on campus. Once they arrive, the students are familiarized with the campus, the atmosphere of a University of Delaware classroom, and its Black community. Some of the events that are scheduled for this year's BMLC are an ice-skating party and several educational panel discussions. The Adopt-a-Classroom and Adopt-a-Highway programs are among the Chapter's many community service efforts. With the Adopt-a-Classroom program, the brothers attend Wilmington Head Start, an inner-city daycare center, several days a week to mentor children. We read books, interact in games, and otherwise provide positive role models to the young children. Once per semester, the chapter gathers together to clean up a local highway in an endeavor to maintain the integrity of our environment. Finally, near the end of the Spring

Semester, the Chapter sponsors its annual Kappa Kabaret. This event, held on a cruise ship in Baltimore's Inner Harbor, is a formal event co-sponsored with the Alpha Iota chapter of **Kappa Alpha Psi.**

In acknowledgment of the chapter's strenuous efforts to uphold the Fraternity's principles, the Northeastern Province has recognized Nu Xi as "Chapter of the Year" as well as "Guide Right Chapter of the Year" for the year of 1999-2000. We expect to be in contention once again for the upcoming year. The chapter remains closely tied to the Northeastern Province, participating in such events as the 2000-2001 Advisor's Workshop, the C. Rodger Wilson Leadership Conference, and on a more local level, Wilmington Alumni's Founder's Day celebration. The conception of the Nu Phi Chapter started through the efforts of two modern day visionaries, Alumni members Roosevelt Green and Robert Lynch. These two individuals initiated the communication between the Grand Chapter and the university. Their commitment and dedication resulted in the establishment of the charter. These two individuals are to be commended for their efforts.

Prior to officially receiving the charter, individuals interested in becoming members of this Great Fraternity at Lock Haven University were initiated at either Lambda Alpha Chapter at Bloomsburg University or Delta Theta Chapter at Penn State University. Records reveal the following individuals were initiated into this Great Fraternity at the designated times:

In moving forward to establish a legacy of Greatness at Lock Haven University, members of the Nu Phi Chapter along with their advisors Green and Lynch proceeded to initiate more individuals into this Noble Klan. Between 1981 and 1993 the members of this Great Fraternity were active in the community and on the campus of Lock Haven University. The members held can drives, donated food to needy families, volunteered at local agencies and excelled in academics. The Nu Phi Chapter also participated in fund-raisers such as dinners, dances and stepshows.

In the spring 1993, darkness came upon the Nu Phi Chapter. During this semester, there were allegations of hazing made against the chapter. The fraternity and university began an investigation. The outcome of the investigation resulted in the deactivation of the Nu Phi Chapter on February 17, 1994.

The Nu Phi Chapter remained inactive from 1994 until fall semester of 2002 when faculty member Keith Bolden, a 1993 initiate of lota Beta, California State University, Fresno, California began the second round of establishing a modern day vision at Lock Haven University. Brother Bolden began making contacts and moving forward to have the Nu Phi Chapter reactivated.

In the fall 2003, Dr. Dwayne Marshall, a Life Member and 1983 initiate of Lambda Sigma Chapter, Nicholls State University, Thibodaux, LA, joined Brother Bolden in his efforts to have the Nu Phi Chapter reactivated. These two individuals worked hard to convince members of the Harrisburg Alumni, the university and Province Polemarch, Brother Michael Brewington that, if reactivated, Nu Phi would return as the premiere chapter not only within the Northeastern Province but the Fraternity as a whole.

These two visionaries, Brothers Bolden and Marshall, expressed their vision of the new Nu Phi Chapter. It involved establishing a chapter that would abide by the rules and regulations of the Fraternity and university. Any and all new members would excel in achieving in every field of human endeavors, which includes striving for high grade point averages, being active on the university campus and in the community and most of all establishing standards for others to follow. Most of all, Brothers Bolden and Marshall

assured the officials they would work hard to prevent the actions of the past that eventually lead to the deactivation of the Nu Phi Chapter.

On October 15, 2003 the hard work of Brothers Bolden and Marshall began to pay off. Harrisburg Alumni Polemarch, Jeffrey Mack and Lock Haven University Vice President of Student Affairs, Dr. Linda Koch agreed to sign a Statement of Collaboration, thus carrying out the first step of crystallizing the dream of reestablishing the Nu Phi Chapter.

Unexpectedly, Brother. Bolden transferred from Lock Haven University in the spring 2004. This action temporarily halted efforts to reactivate the chapter. In the Fall 2004, Lock Haven University hired a new faculty member, Dr. Charles Crowley, a 1996 initiate of Jefferson City Alumni. Together, these two individuals continued carrying the torch to have the Nu Phi Chapter reactivated.

Brothers Crowley and Marshall began the task of attending advising sessions, Alumni meetings, fraternity conferences and meetings with pertinent individuals all for the purpose of presenting the new vision of the Nu Phi Chapter. It should be noted there was a lot of resistance from all sources mainly because of the history of the chapter.

In the end, Brothers Crowley and Marshall managed to convince all parties that the new Nu Phi Chapter was going to be totally different from the past. Province Polemarch Michael Brewington announced he would support the reactivation of the Nu Phi Chapter based upon the presentation as put forth by Brothers Crowley and Marshall and the recommendation of the supervising entity, Harrisburg Alumni. Province Polemarch Brewington also acknowledged he would present a recommendation to the Grand Board of Directors to have the Nu Phi Chapter reactivated. In the meantime, Brothers Marshall and Crowley were instructed they could move forward to produce new initiated under the Delta Theta Chapter.

In the spring 2006, efforts were made by Brothers Crowley and Marshall to revitalize the Nu Phi Chapter. They convened five individuals who would later constitute the first group of initiates after reactivation. These individuals are:

These individual participated in the intake process on April 7, 2006, in Springfield, Massachusetts. This was the first intake in over a decade. These individuals were introduced to the Lock Haven University on April 11, 2006, at the university fountain located in the center of campus.

On that Great day of June 16, 2006, at the Grand Board of Director meeting of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc., a motion was put forth to reactivate the Nu Phi Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity at Lock Haven University. The motion was unanimously passed, thus reactivating the Nu Phi Chapter.

The cumulating events have led to the reestablishment of the Nu Phi Chapter. As promised, the Nu Phi Chapter will prove itself to be the premiere chapter of the Northeastern Province, thus establishing itself as the Jewel of the Northeastern Province.

Immediately, the Nu Phi Chapter began establishing itself as the premiere chapter. An agreement was made with PENNDOT and the Nu Phi Chapter to participate in the Adopt-a-Highway Program. The Brothers established an annual Meet and Greet program designed to inform students about the fraternity and its activities. Community service projects were established with the local Hospital and Hospice programs.

The Brothers of the Nu Phi Chapter engaged in fund-raisers such as 50/50, Toga parties, raffles and other types of fund-raisers. In addition to raising funds, members of the Nu Phi Chapter have made outstanding achievements at the university and community. Jaivon Lewis campaigned and was crowned King of Homecoming 2006. He is president of Distinguished Gentlemen and Vice President of the Black Student Union. Charles Mickens was elected president of the famous poetry club, *Spoken Word*. Both Brothers Mickens and Lewis are also student senators with the Student Cooperative Council. Wesley Brown is President of Loc Entertainment. Walter Brown is the Vice-President of Loc Entertainment. Richard Graham is the vice president of 2nd Family, a student club. The university selected the famous photo depicting the Brothers standing in front of the university fountain as the cover photo for the university's official Christmas card.

The Nu Phi Chapter has become a chapter destined to achieve in every field of human endeavors. The chapter goal is to live the example of what it means to truly be a Kappaman. This will be accomplished through community service, leadership and most of all, brotherhood. This is the Nu Phi way.

Chapter 9

The Nineties

The Nineties

The fall of communism in the early 1990s spurred the longest period of prosperity in the nation's history. The DOW went from the 3,000s to the 10,000s. This prosperity gave the Northeastern Province a modest growth, in spite of large number of chapters existing within its boundaries. Eight active chapters and two alumni chapters were chartered during this decade. The active and alumni chapters were Nu Psi of the University of Connecticut (June 16, 1990), Xi Gamma of Rowan University (December 4, 1991), Xi Delta of Princeton University (April 12, 1991), Xi Eta of Mansfield University (January 5, 199), Xi Kappa of Bucknell University (September 22, 1991), Xi Mu of Wesley College (September 9, 1992), Xi Omicorn of Long Island University (C. W. Post campus) (January 24, 1993), Xi Zeta of New York Institute of Technology (Central Islip campus) December 15, 1991), Providence Alumni of RI (March 10, 1990) and United Kingdom Alumni of AE (June 16, 1990). In addition, the State College Alumni Association was chartered on February 17, 1990.

Northeastern Province Polemarchs

Northeastern Polemarch Samuel C. Hamilton was reappointed to serve a second term (1990-1991). Upon the recommendation of the Northeastern Province Board of Directors, the Grand Polemarchs appointed three additional Northeastern Province Polemarchs to serve during the 1990s. They were Herman B. Thomas, Jr.of Harrisburgh Alumni (1991-1995), Dennis T. Golden of Philadelphia Alumni (1995-1999), and Dr. Tilghman L. Moore of Burlington-Camden Alumni (1999-2002).

Northeastern Province Councils in the Nineties

During the weekend of December 8, 1995, the Grand Board of Directors lifted the moratorium imposed on intake by Grand Polemarch Robert L. Harris on August 15, 1994, allowing for undergraduate intake to resume on a case-by-case basis. To standardize the initiation, the Northeastern Province, under the leadership of Northeastern Province Polemarch Dennis T. Golden, decided to hold Province-wide initiations. The first Province initiation was held in 1996 at the Northeastern Province Meeting, hosted by Dover Alumni Chapter on March 21-24, 1996. Over 400 guests were registered at this Council Meeting, making it the largest Province Council Meeting in the history of the Province. Many of the brothers and Silhouettes were graduates of Delaware State College in Dover, Delaware and they used this occasion to revisit the campus and renew old acquaintances. Others visited the Dover mall and took advantage of Delaware's no-tax shopping.
